

Weekly Flood Situation Report for the Mekong River Basin

Prepared at: 18/08/2014, covering the week from the 11th Aug to the 18th Aug 2014

Weather Patterns, General Behaviour of the Mekong River and Flood Situation

General weather patterns

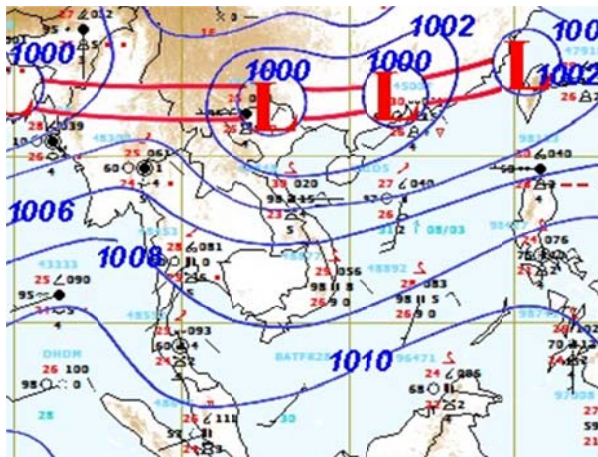


Figure 1: Weather map for 12th Aug 2014

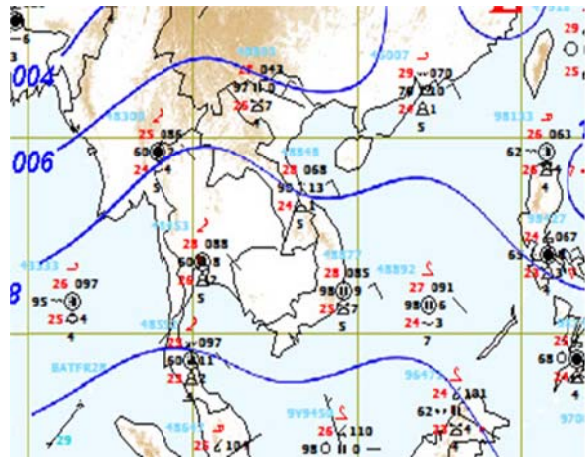


Figure 2: Weather map for 16th Aug 2014

During the week of 11th Aug to 18th Aug 2014 three weather bulletins were issued by the Department of Meteorology (DOM) of Cambodia. The weather maps of the 12th Aug and 16th Aug 2014 are presented in the Figures 1 and 2 below:

Moderate South-West (SW) Monsoon

The Southwest monsoon prevails over Myanmar, the Andaman Sea and the Gulf of Thailand at the surface during the week. (Figure 1 and 2).

Inter Tropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ)

No ITCZ was observed during last week.

Tropical depressions (TD), tropical storms (TS) or typhoons (TY)

No TD, TS or TY was observed during last week.

Other weather phenomena that affect the discharge

The weak trough of low pressure lies across Myanmar, Thailand, Cambodia, Lao PDR and Viet Nam at the height of 1.5km at the end of last week.

Over weather situation

The weather of the last week was influenced by Southwest monsoon and the weak trough of low pressure that laid across Myanmar, Thailand, Cambodia, Lao PDR and Viet Nam. Therefore, isolated heavy rainfalls had happened in many areas in the upper and middle reaches of LMB. The accumulative weekly rainfall greater than 100 mm is at Paksane (105.5 mm.). 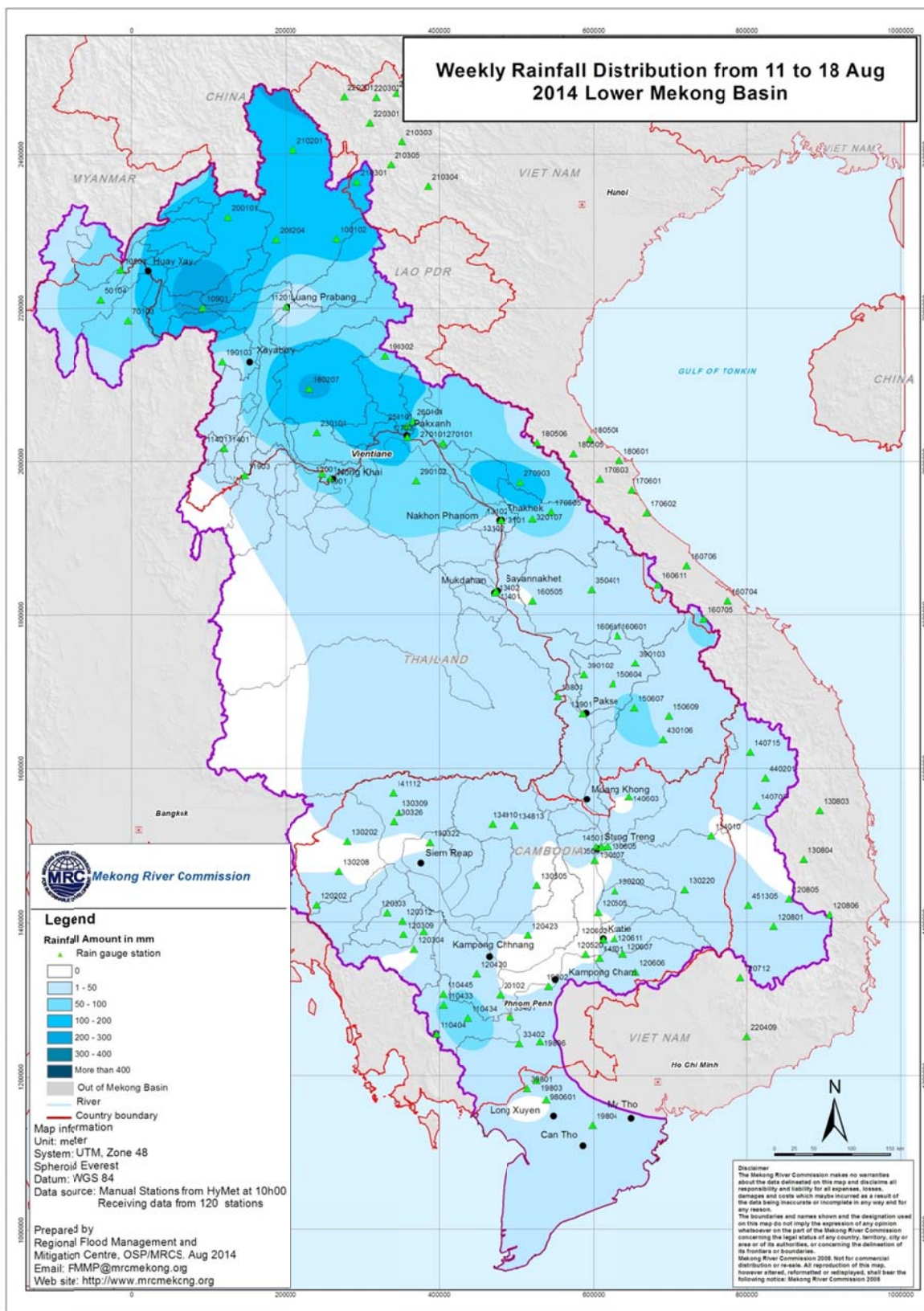


Figure 3: Weekly Rainfall Distribution from 11th – 18th Aug 2014 over the LMB

General behaviour of the Mekong River

During the last week, the water levels at most stations in upper LMB were fluctuating below the Long Term Average (LTA) start from Chiang Saen to Pasane, just passed below the LTA in middle LMB from Nakon Phanom to Strung Treng and still above the LTA in lower LMB from Kratie to Chau Doc.

For stations from Chiang Saen and Luang Prabang

Compared to the long term average (LTA), the water levels at these stations were fluctuating below the LTA.

For stations from Chiang Khan, Vientiane and Nong Khai and Paksane

Compared to the long term average (LTA), the water levels at these stations were fluctuating below the LTA.

For stations from Thakhet/Nakon Phanom to Pakse

Compared to the long term average (LTA), the water levels at these stations were recessing below the LTA.

For stations from Stung Treng to Kompong Cham

Compared to the long term average (LTA), the water levels at these stations were recessing above the LTA except Stung Treng that was below the LTA.

For stations from Phnom Penh to Koh Khel/Neak Luong

Compared to the long term average (LTA), the water levels at these stations were recessing above the LTA.

Tan Chau and Chau Doc

Compared to the long term average (LTA), the water levels at both stations were recessing above the LTA.

Note: For areas between forecast stations, please refer to the nearest forecast station.

Flood Situation

▪ Flood stage or alarm stage:

No alarm stage (where the forecast is expected to reach flood level within three days) was reported anywhere on the mainstream of the Mekong River during the last week. Water levels were still significantly below flood levels (as defined by the national agency) at all forecast stations.

▪ Damage or victims:

No damage or loss of life due to river flooding was recorded anywhere along the Mekong River during the last week.

Figure A1: Water level and rainfall for Jinghong, Chiang Saen, and Luang Prabang

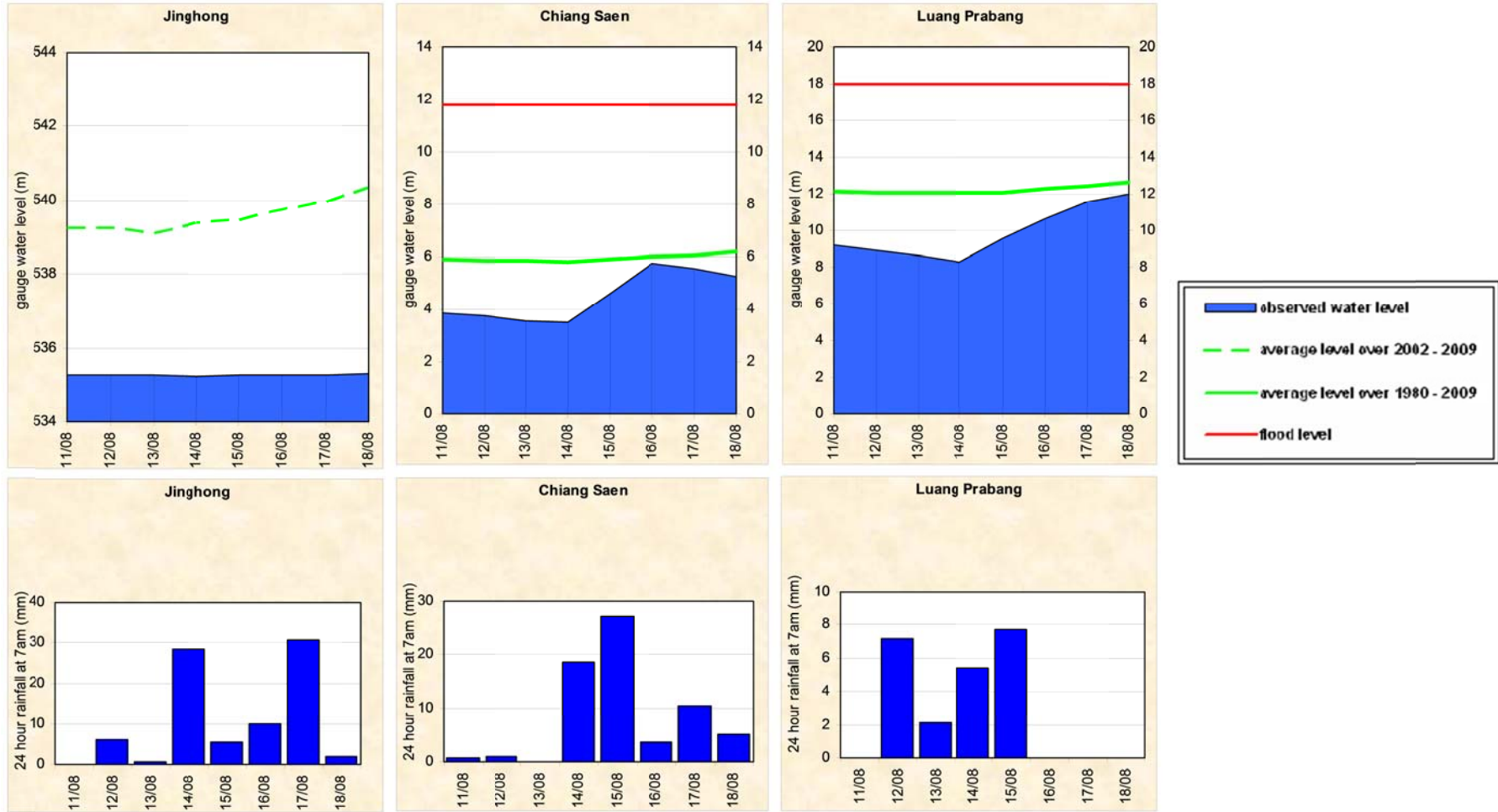


Figure A2: Water level and rainfall for Chiang Khan, Vientiane, Nongkhai, and Paksane

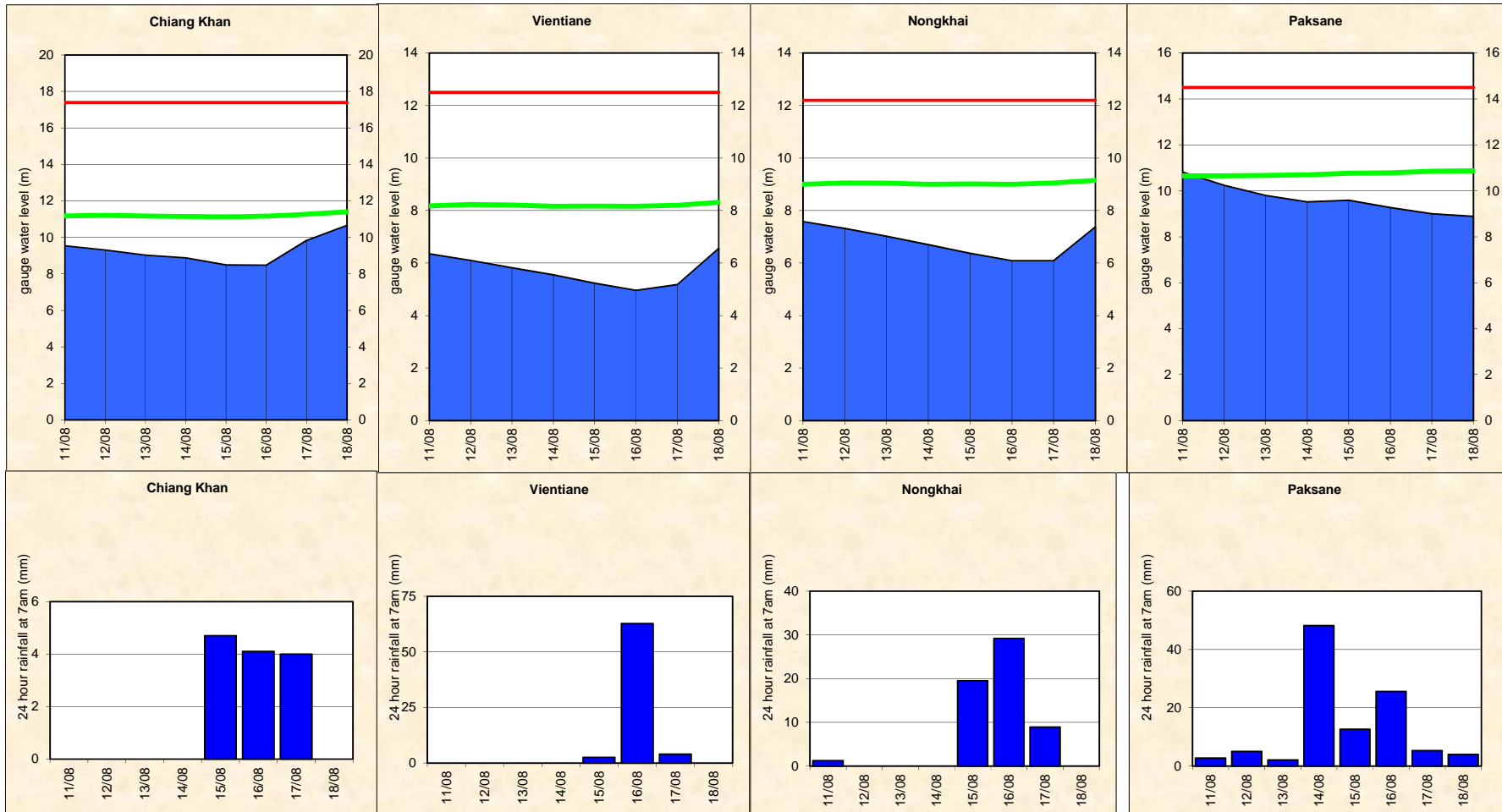
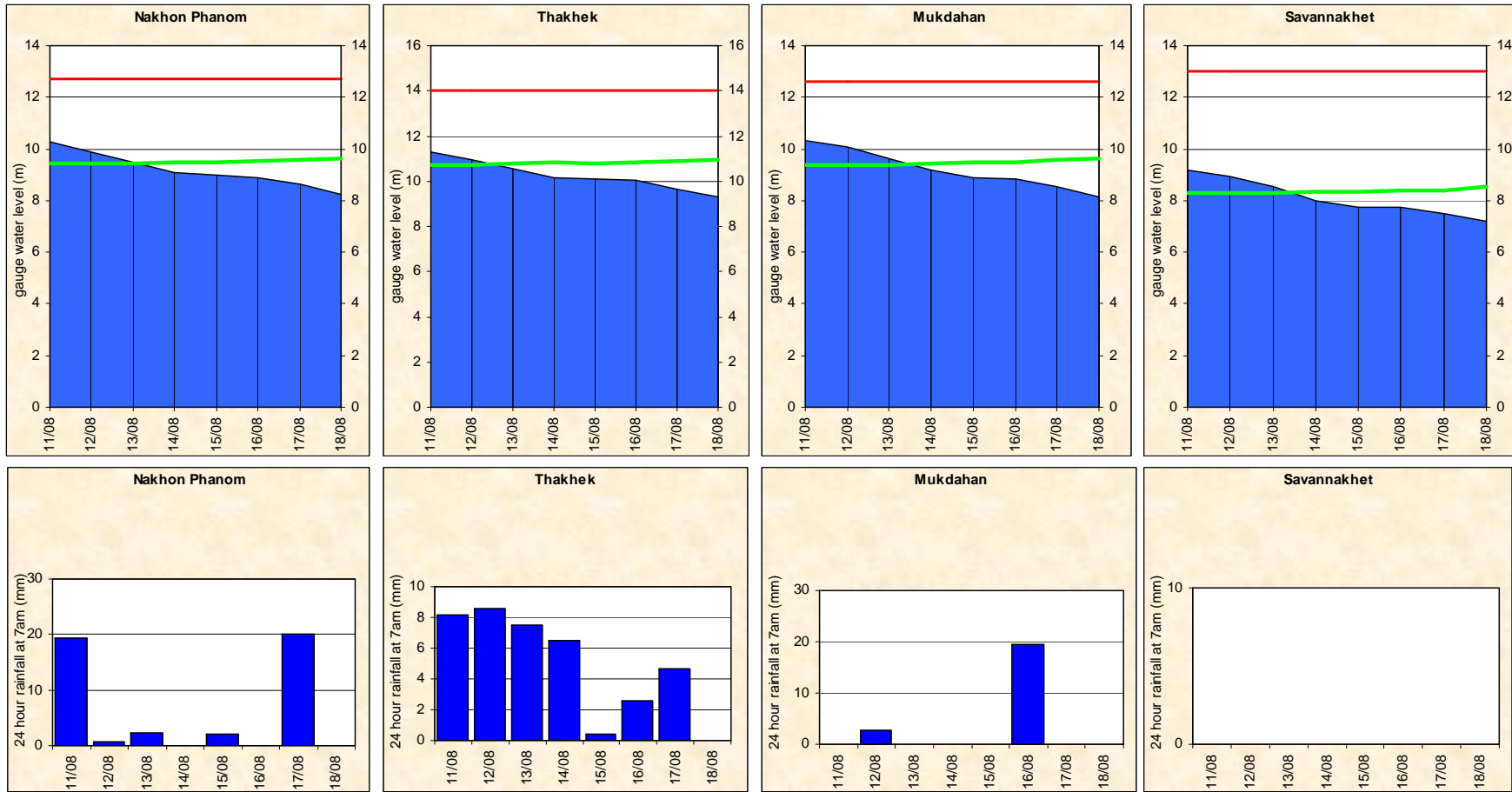


Figure A3: Water level and rainfall for Nakhon Phanom, Thakhek, Mukdahan and Savannakhet

Figure A4: Water level and rainfall for Khong Chiam, Pakse, Stung Treng, and Kratie

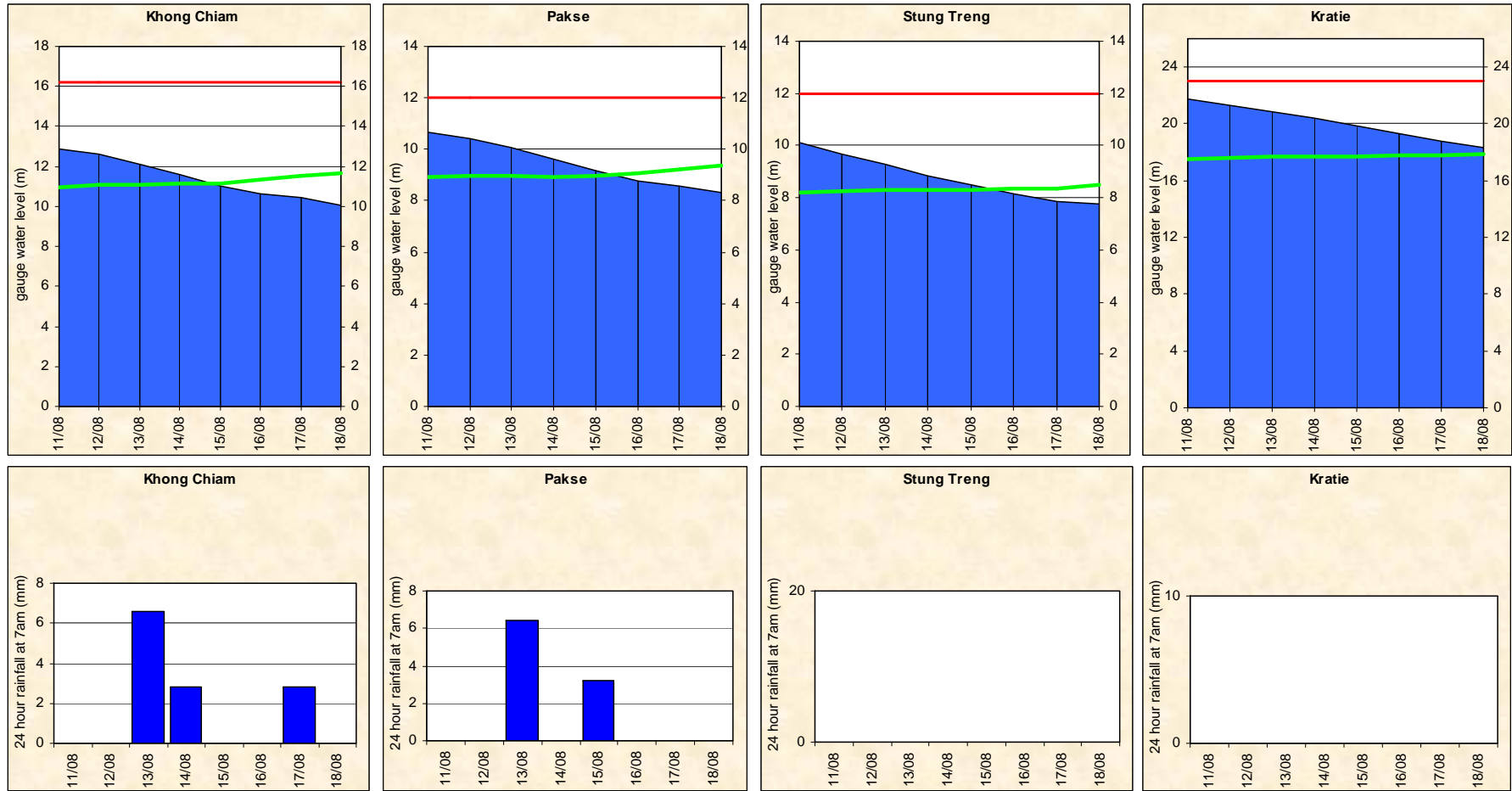


Figure A5: Water level and rainfall for Kompong Cham, Phnom Penh (Bassac and Port), and Koh Khel

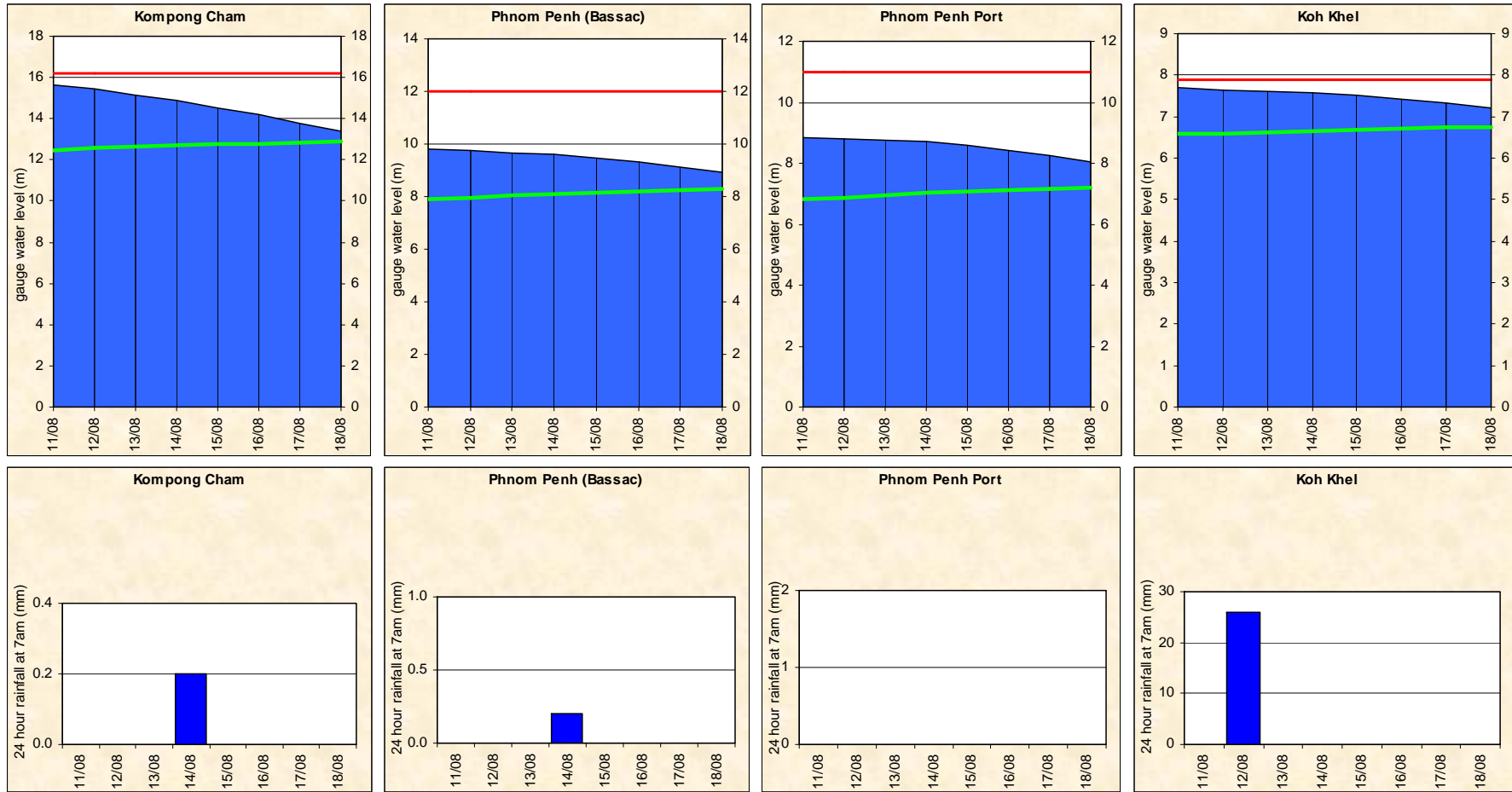
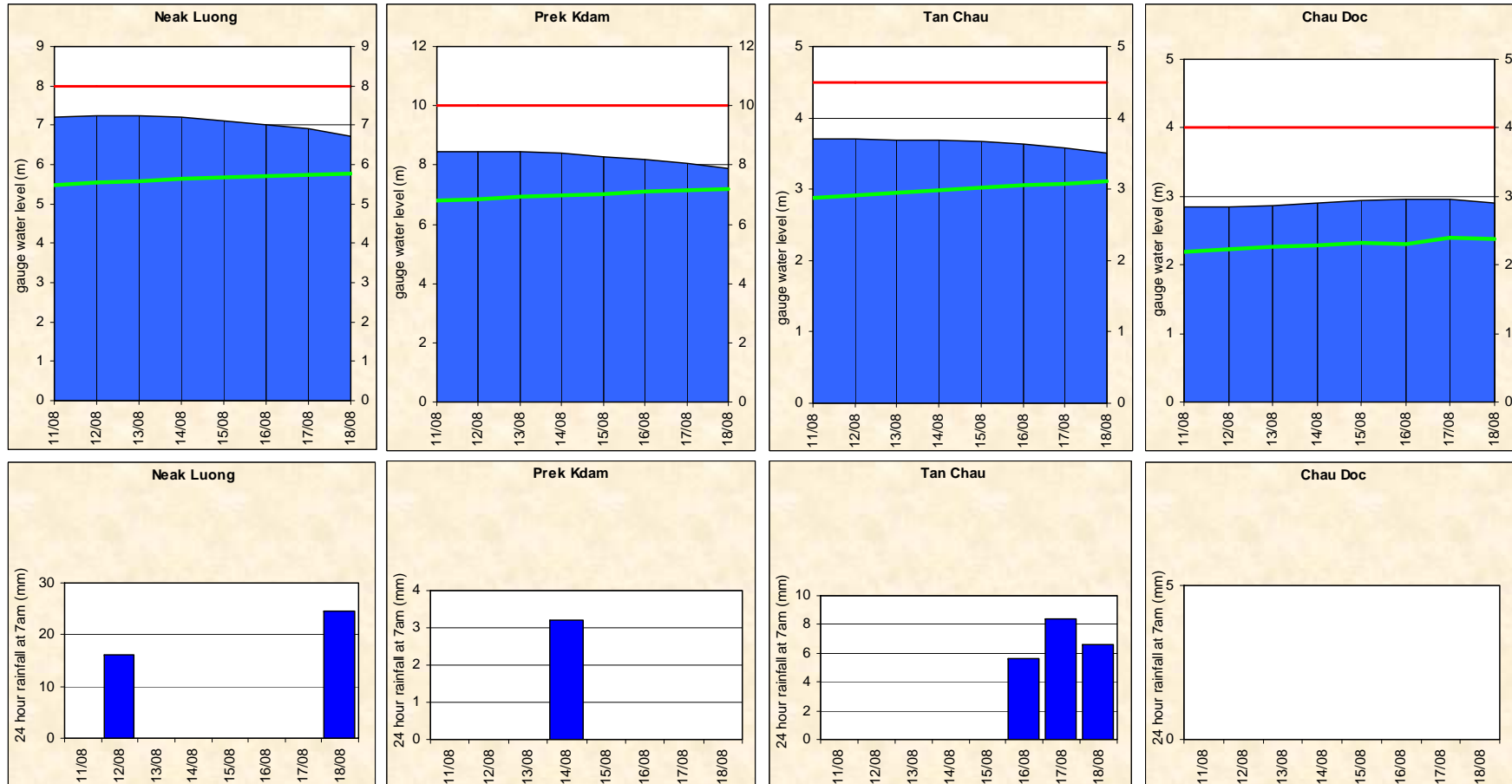


Figure A6: Water level and rainfall for Neak Luong, Prek Kdam, Tan Chau and Chau Doc



Annex B: Accuracy and performance

Accuracy

“Accuracy” describes the accuracy of the adjusted and published forecast, based on the results of the MRC Mekong Flood Forecasting System, which are then adjusted by the Flood Forecaster in Charge taking into consideration known biases in input data and his/her knowledge of the response of the model system and the hydrology of the Mekong River Basin. The information is presented as a graph below, showing the average flood forecasting accuracy along the Mekong mainstream.

In general, the overall accuracy is fairly good for 1-day to 5-day forecast lead time at stations

in the lower parts of the LMB. However, the accuracies at Luang Prabang, Khong Chiam to Kratie for 3-day to 5-day forecast were less than expected.

The above differences due to two main factors: (1) internal model functionality in forecasting; for which the parameter adjustment in the model is not possible especially at stations in the upper part and in the Mekong delta where are affected by tidal; (2) the adjustment by utilizing the practical knowledge and experience of flood forecaster-in-charge.

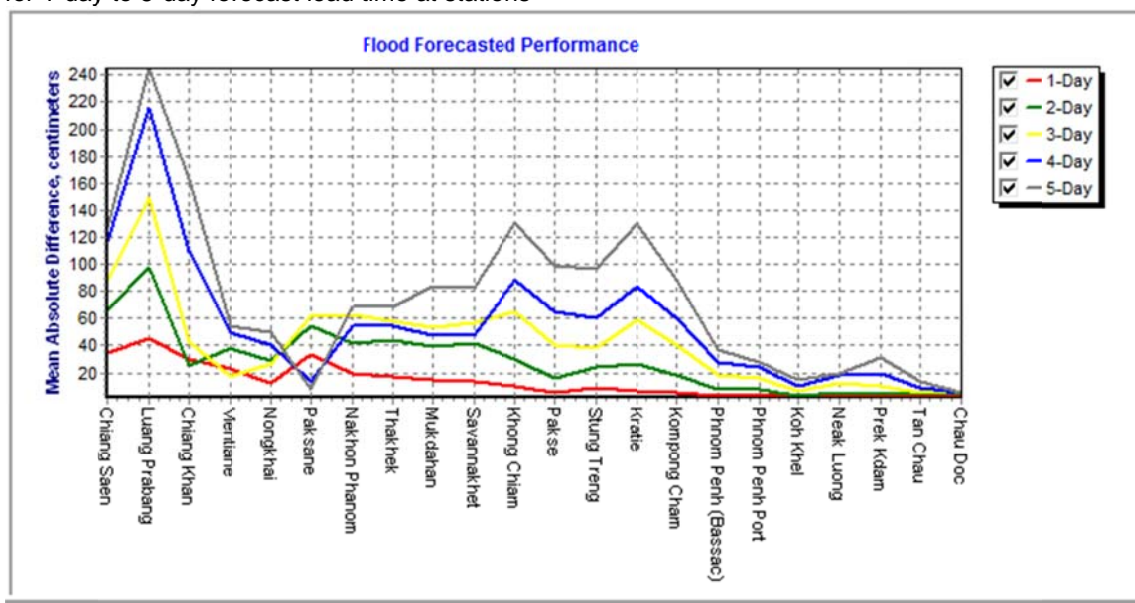


Figure B1: Average flood forecast accuracy along the Mekong mainstream

The forecast achievement indicates the % of days that the forecast at a particular station for a lead-time is successful against a respective benchmark (Table B2).

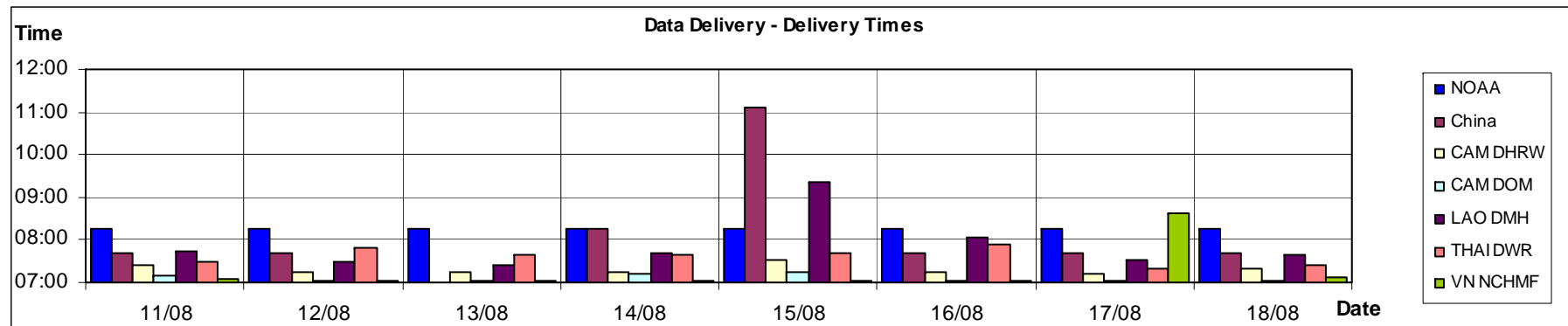


Figure B2: Data delivery times for the past 8 days including the current report date

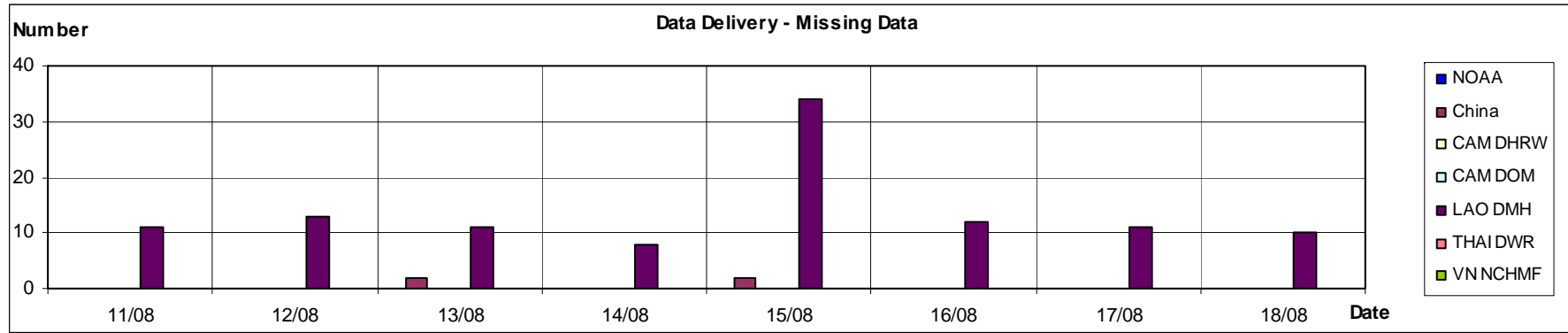


Figure B3: Missing data for the past 8 days including the current report date

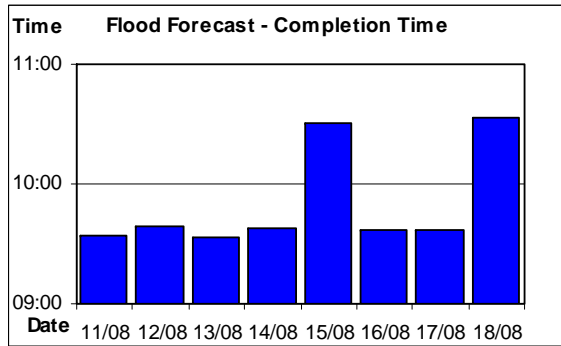


Figure B4: Flood forecast completion time

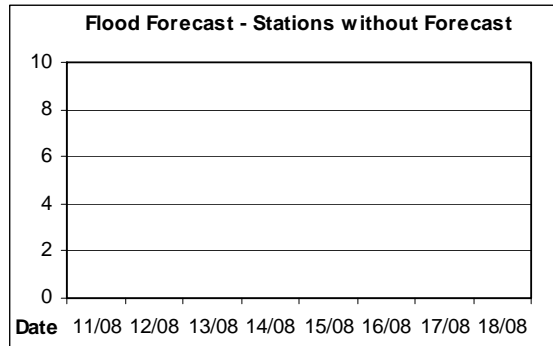


Figure B5: Flood forecast stations without forecast

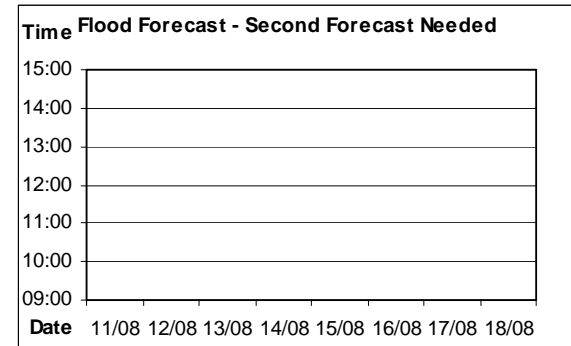


Figure B6: Second forecast needed
